How long will I be in the recovery room?

You will spend some time in the recovery room. Your blood pressure and pulse will be checked regularly and you may be given some oxygen to breathe.

When you are more awake, you will be taken back to the ward. After a short time, you will be given something to eat and drink.

When you are comfortable and have recovered from the anaesthetic, you will be offered something to eat and drink. Most people recover within a few hours of their operation. Once recovered, you will be discharged home.

What are the signs of infection?

It is possible you may experience an infection following your operation. However, all precautions to minimise this will be taken. Please contact your GP or breast care nurse if you have concerns or if any of the following symptoms occur, as they may indicate infection:

- Increasing pain
- A temperature/fever
- Swelling or increased redness at the wound site

When can I return to work?

You will be able to return to work when you feel able to resume normal activities.

Because you have had a general anaesthetic, do not bath or shower for 24 hours. You will probably have a waterproof dressing over your wound which will allow you to shower or bathe as normal. We will advise you prior to going home when the dressing can be removed.

Wear a soft support bra day and night, if needed, for at least one week. This will help support the breast, lessen any discomfort and help the healing process, and should reduce scarring.

Any bruising will resolve over the next week.

You may have some discomfort, so take painkillers such as paracetamol, if needed.

You may feel a little more tired during the first few days. Allow yourself 48 hours to get over the effects of the anaesthetic. Avoid heavy lifting for one week, but continue to increase your daily activities. You can resume your normal routine after 7-10 days.

Resume driving when the wound has healed and you have full range of arm/shoulder movements.

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You will be informed by nurses prior to your going home if the consultant needs to see you again in the Outpatients Department. Alternatively, they may phone you with the result.
