

Styes, meibomian cysts and hot compresses

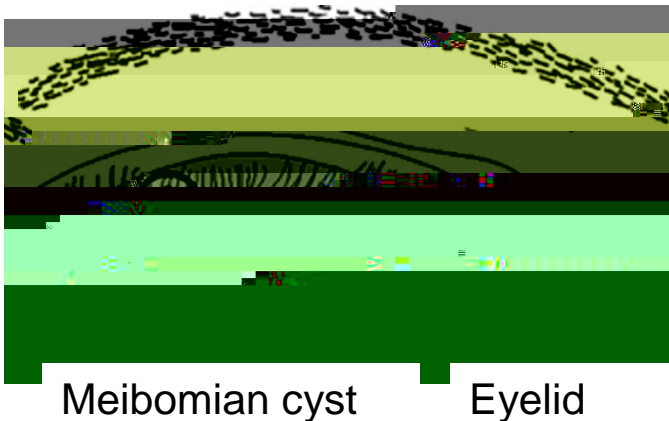

An anti-biotic ointment may be prescribed to apply to the eyelid at the site of the styte.

Whilst suffering with one or more styes, it is advisable to use your own flannel and towel, and avoid using make-up.

A meibomian cyst is a pea-like swelling in the eyelid. It is caused by inflammation of one or more small glands in the eyelid, called meibomian glands.

This cyst can become infected, causing pain, tenderness and redness.



Meibomian cysts are often associated with a condition affecting the lid margins called blepharitis. If you have this condition, you will be given instruction on how to clean the eyelids in a special way to prevent recurrences. A leaflet called Blepharitis is available from the Eye Clinic.

Treatment

Regular hot compresses to the affected eyelid.

Anti-biotic ointment may be prescribed, and on occasions anti-biotic tablets may be prescribed if a more-generalised infection of the eyelid is present.

Meibomian cysts often resolve with the above treatment; however, it is sometimes necessary to drain them by making a small incision on the inside of the lid. This is done after an injection of local anaesthetic.

The procedure is short and not painful, with an eye pad placed over the eye for approximately two hours. You will be given some anti-biotic ointment to use for a few days. This procedure is done in the Eye Clinic, no sooner than six weeks after the onset of the cyst.

Hot compresses can be very helpful for people who have repeated episodes of meibomian cysts.

Using a pad or clean flannel dipped in hot water, apply to the closed lids. Repeat several times. You may need to re heat the pad as it cools down.
